 Dear Sister I Received your Letter ~~then~~ and
 was very glad to hear from you and
 to know that you are all well I am
 well at present But Bill is not so well
 Playing Sunday Soldier is no more
 for since we got in to the enemy
 country we have to march But we
 have to be ready at a moments
 warning as the Rebels is not far off
 we left Danley town on Last Wednesday
 evening and marched till about
 11 o'clock that night Doublequick most
 of the way with over Knapsacks
 on and they were pretty heavy
 I never was as tired in all my life

as it was that night after we
crossed the chainbridge we halted
about three minets when By accede
nt one of the privets fell over a high
wall how much he was hurt i could
not tell as we marched on we went
a couple of miles fadder and then
halted for the rest of the night And
never was an order more welcome
then that one. we sped over Blanks
ts on the wet grass Layed down
with our knapsacks for pillows
and slept till morning. then we got
up pretty nigh froze eat a cracker or two
then marched on to where we are at
this present time. But i cant tell
where we will be when this
reaches you But i hope we are done
mornning for a while for it is poor
Buissness to move so often But i sup
pose we will have little rest now
for a while as we antispate a fight
most every hour. we have had
very hard times since we have

been hear on Thursday it rained
all day and we had no tents over
tents did not get along so we had
to build Shantys of some sort to
sleep in. the Rails of the Genies
had to fly and the cornfodder
some that was cut and some we
cut with corn and all on it
and hay thair was no less then
three stacks of hay carried off for
Beds. But with all the Rain came
though and we when Raining
wet till morning. on Friday
we had very good living as
we had fresh pork. Some of
the fellows recut out a scouting
and fetched in several Fat Hogs
weighing from 25 lbs to 200 lbs
and some of them got chickens
and Sheep Besides we got plenty
to eat we got 2 pints of coffee a day
1 pint of Bean Soup and as many
crackers as you want Bread we
get about half the time one loaf
a day

plenty of Salt Beef and pork.
Sometimes Rice and so forth
i think we got along pretty
well in Regards to Living I
dont now how it will go
when we get fudder in to
Virginia But i hope we will
get enough to eat it is getting
pretty cold in morning and
evenings it makes one shiver
we have not got a very pretty
place to camp at present and it
is a wheat field and it is very
muddy But if it would not
rain we would soon have it
pretty well beat down
I must bring my scribbling to
a close you must excuse for
i have no place to write

Tell the Boys we wher going
to have over Sikenness's taken
and send them to them But
we cant Just now
