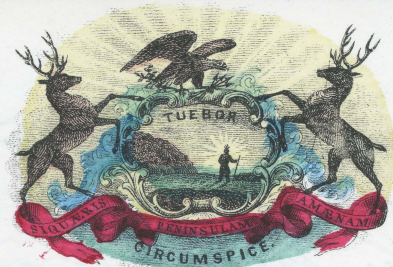

Camp, Michigan, 3rd Dec^r, 1861
Dear Sister

Your letter of
the eighth reached here today and
I was very glad to hear from
you again and you must write
as often as you care but I
will write as often as there
is any news to write. We have
moved from our old camp
about three or four miles
and have camped in a place
that has been laying sick
for some time and is
growing up to small pine

so we have a very good
warm camp we are very comfort-
table have very good beds straw
beds filled with straw
and a stove in our tent
so we live as comfortable as
we would at home we have
four new tents to each
company and the old ones
are two of them put toget-
her and they make a warm
tent I have got so used
to soldiering that I like
it very well and think
I would not quit the
business for farming
or anything else at the
present time I don't want
to leave soldiering until
the whole affair is settled
but the sooner we have
the fighting the old and

get it settled the better
I shall like it I have
written two letters to
Uncle George since I received
one from him perhaps
he has not received the
letters but I should
think he would get
them as regular as
you so I received a letter
today from Mary and
her man there is no
more news to write at
present there is but very
little news here and I write
little news there is is
not worth writing
Please tell Uncle George
about my writing
and see if he has
received them no more
